Principal's Message

Colonel Mitchell Paige, home of the Patriots, opened its doors for the first time in August, 2006. Our goal is to prepare our students for success at the next grade level and thus, into the future, even after they leave us and move on to high school. Teachers deliver curriculum that adheres to the Common Core State Standards and use a variety of instructional strategies to meet the needs of all students. They reach out to students beyond the classroom and offer tutoring, afterschool sports, clubs, performing arts, robotics, AVID, ASB, and Renaissance. Good attendance, grades, and positive behavior are continually emphasized. All students have the opportunity to enroll in AVID which emphasizes organization, time management, self-monitoring of grades and homework, and preparation each day for school. Every student at Paige has an Advisory Class that meets weekly which acts like a homeroom where students take care of activities through i-Ready and ST Math to help support ELA and math skills. They are also able to work on other activities like digital citizenship, homework checks, and other school business.

Since the 2016-17 school year, students have become familiar with the school's new vision and belief statement which guide behavior and expectations on the campus. Each student is given a student agenda that communicates all the rules and expectations of our school. Teachers in the core subjects of math, language arts, science, and social studies follow District guidelines in regards to curriculum/instruction developed through PLC's and data collaboration and professional development to support them. The school believes in a strong parent connection and working together. Communication with the home is vital and information is sent via our website, marquee, weekly parent letters, notices, phone calls, parent/teacher conferences, emails, and ParentVUE.

Parents have opportunities to get directly involved with the school community by participating in the Parent Teacher Organization (PTO), School Site Council (SSC), parent education opportunities, and volunteering. Paige Middle School has a dedicated staff and believes in continual improvement. Mutual respect and responsibility of all stakeholders, along with a strong academic program, creates a school where "Patriot Pride cannot be denied."

Taking advantage of Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP), we have created a space for students to be engaged in after school opportunities.

School Description

Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School is located in the northwestern region of La Quinta and serves students in grades six through eight following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2022-23 school year, 436 students were enrolled, including 18.1% in special education, 18.6% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 75.2% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch.

Student Achievement

Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in grade seven. The physical fitness test (PFT) for students in California schools is the FITNESSGRAM. The main goal of the test is to help students in starting life-long habits of regular physical activity.

The FITNESSGRAM has six parts, though California currently requires five parts be completed annually, that show a level of fitness that offer a degree of defense against diseases that come from inactivity. The test results can be used by students, teachers, and parents. Comparative District and state results can be found at the CDE's web site www.cde.ca.gov/ta/tg/pf.

In the administration of the PFT during 2021-22 and 2022-23 school years, only participation results are required for these five fitness areas.

California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress

The California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) System includes the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments (SBAC) for students in the general education population, and the California Alternate Assessments (CAAs) for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. Only eligible students may participate in the administration of the CAAs. CAAs items are aligned with alternative achievement standards, which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). CAASPP results are a measure of how well students are mastering California's standards in English language arts/literacy (ELA) and mathematics, and are given to grades three through eight and grade eleven. SBAC tests assess student performance in ELA/Literacy and mathematics utilizing computer-adaptive tests and performance tasks, and CAAs test items are aligned with alternative achievement standards which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS).

The CAASPP results shown in this report include overall results comparing the school, district and state scores as well as the school's overall score in each applicable subgroup. Results are shown only for subgroups with ten students or more taking the exam. For those categories that are blank in the tables, no students met subgroup criteria. School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School's original facilities were built in 2006; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Every morning before school begins, the assistant principal and the custodian inspect facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and one evening custodians are assigned to Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- Groundskeeping
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Exterior maintenance

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- · Classroom cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Locker room cleaning
- Site prep for school events and outside organization use of facilities

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Rating Description

Good: The school is maintained in good repair with a number of non-critical deficiencies noted. These deficiencies are isolated, and/or result from minor wear and tear, and/or are in the process of being mitigated.

Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, administration, teachers, the counselor, the facilitator, and school site monitors patrol the campus, entrance areas, and designated common areas. Administrators, school site monitors, the counselor, the facilitator, and security agents monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and common student activity areas. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, administrators, teachers, school site monitors, the counselor, the facilitator, and security agents monitor student behavior and ensure students either leave campus or travel to after-school activities in a safe and orderly manner.

Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office with a valid state issued identification to be scanned through the Raptor Security System and wear an identification sticker while on school grounds. They must then check out at the school office upon exit from the school site.

School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan will be reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff by March 1, 2024.

Classroom Environment

Discipline & Climate for Learning

Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School's discipline practices and behavior management strategies comply with approved board policies and are designed to create effective learning environments and minimize classroom disruptions. Progressive discipline and proactive measures are employed in the classroom for those students experiencing difficulty following school rules and demonstrating positive behavior. Disciplinary intervention is managed by school administrators in a fair, firm, and consistent manner based upon the nature of each situation. All staff works with students through PRIDE reflection forms, intervening in class with Restorative Circles.

Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by all staff using tools such as teacher input and data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School supports ongoing professional growth throughout the year on early release days. Teachers meet in grade level teams to conduct data analysis to identify areas of need. Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training sessions as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow-up training for newly implemented programs/curricula.

Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Colonel Mitchell Paige Middle School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's eight-year adoption cycle for core content (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, October 03, 2023, the Desert Sands Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution No. 08/2023-2024 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2023-24 school year, Desert Sands Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

Expenditures Per Student
