

 Requirements of the Law

California Healthy Youth Act (CHYA)

- Purpose: protect and promote good health and safety
- Strengthens and clarifies required content - some new required topics
- More inclusive tone and prohibits discrimination - expands and strengthens existing requirements that instruction and materials be appropriate for students of all sexual orientations and genders

Curricular Requirements

All components align with and support the purpose of the California Healthy Youth Act At least once in junior high/middle school and at least once in high school, starting in grade 7

Tone and content consistent across all instruction and materials

Recognize that people have different sexual orientations and include same-sex relationships in examples

California Healthy Youth Act (CHYA)



Encourages students to communicate with parents, guardians, or other trusted adults and provides knowledge and skills necessary for these discussions

EDUCATION CODE 51933



ED Code 220

No person shall be subjected to discrimination on the basis of disability, gender, gender identity, gender expression, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, or any other characteristic that is contained in the definition of hate crimes set forth in Section 422.55 of the Penal Code...



Cardea and Opt-Out

- CHYA permits parents/guardians to opt out of "all or part" of comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention instruction.
- Schools may not facilitate the selective opt-out of lessons that are focused on LGBTQ content.
- CHYA requires that schools integrate LGBTQ people throughout the curriculum and may not isolate this content to specific lessons.
- When applying this to Positive Prevention Plus, to comply with CHYA it is unlawful to opt out of lesson one in middle school and the Getting Started lesson in high school.

Parental notification & opt-out

At the beginning of the school year...*

Notice: Districts must notify parents of the instruction and provide them with opportunities to view the curriculum and other instructional materials.

Opt-out: Districts must also allow parents to remove their student from instruction if they so choose, using a passive consent ("opt-out") process in which parents must request in writing that their student not receive the instruction.

Districts may not require active consent ("opt-in") by requiring that students return a permission slip in order to receive the instruction.

Parent Opt-out Options

Parents can Opt-out of All Lessons

- -14 lessons in Middle School
- -14 lessons in High School
- -12 lessons for Special Education (MS/HS)




Parent Opt-out Options

Selected Lesson Opt-out Options:

- ~If parents choose this option:
 - -you cannot opt-out of Middle School Lesson 1
 - -you cannot opt-out of the High School "Getting Started" Lesson
 - -you cannot opt-out of Special Education Lesson I

To Opt-Out, written communication (letter or email) to the Principal <u>must</u> indicate the student will be opting out of:

ALL Lessons,

or

- Specific lessons by number except for
 - o MS Lesson I
 - o HS "Getting Started" Lesson
 - Special Ed Lesson I


Communication with Parents

- -letter will also go out via email if set up in School Messenger









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

OVERARCHING GOALS AND VALUES

 Promote health, safety, inclusivity, respect, and access to legally available options so that adolescents are able to protect their health



HISTORY

- Developed in 1993 through a partnership with the American Red Cross, updated regularly
- Underwent a rigorous evaluation from 2010-2015
- Federal Evidence Based Interventions
- Reviewed for CHYA compliance
 - The Adolescent Sexual Health Work Group (ASHWG)— a group of experts from the California Departments of Education and Public Health





EFFECTIVE FEATURES

- ·Biomedical information limited to the essential concepts
- Emphasis on social and decision-making skills
- Utilizes modeling and positive peer discussions
- Involves parents
- Variety of learning styles

AMERICAN JOURNAL OF PUBLIC HEALTH

Conclusions:

- Positive Prevention PLUS program demonstrated positive impacts on adolescent sexual behavior, including significant impacts on delaying sexual intercourse and increasing the use of birth control.
- Suggests that programs that focus on having students practice risk reduction skills may delay sexual activity and increase birth control use.
